What is CATS?

Creative Art Team Support (CATS) is a diverse cross-section of the Apogaea population dedicated to maintaining a community that cultivates interest in and pursuit of art, music, and artistic expression by awarding creative grants and facilitating art at the event.

- CATS members agree upon <u>a standard</u> by which creative grants can be awarded in a non-biased, transparent manner
- CATS members agree to a set of <u>CATS Member Expectations</u>
- CATS members operate in a 100% transparent environment: Read last year's 2017 End of Year Report.
- CATS members agree to immediately communicate <u>Conflicts of Interest</u> to CATS
- CATS is open to any volunteer wanting to discuss art and Apogaea
- CATS members put in a lot of volunteer time each year

Membership in CATS is open to all participants in the Apogaea community

All members of CATS are active members of Apogaea, Inc. (aka Ignition)

- Roles are filled by nominating and voting on CATS members to fill a given role at a monthly meeting.
- CATS confirm whether they will be returning for the next event year in July post-event. CATS begins recruiting for new members in September and ratify/vote on new members in October/November
- CATS meets once a month for approximately 2 hours (24 volunteer hours per volunteer per year), plus two additional longer 4 hour grant scoring meetings (8 volunteer hours per volunteer per year)
- CATS spend an additional approximate 10 hours independently reviewing and scoring applications during each grant cycle (20 volunteer hours per volunteer per year)

- CATS also each have 1-2 additional dedicated roles and tasks to complete in support of the CATS department, and spend an additional 5-10 hours a month depending on the position (60-120 volunteer hours per year)
- Finally CATS are expected to participate in all Ignition votes such as the BOD election, ticket art, and theme contests

There were 8 CATS members serving in 2018:

- While CATS has held up to 22 members in the past, after operating with a smaller, more focused team of 8 for 2016-2018, it is agreed that a team of this size is much more productive and easier to manage.
- Ongoing, CATS membership will be capped at a maximum of 9 Ignition members for this reason (with a possible 10th reserve CAT allowed). While we have had 8 members the past 2 years a 9th would be welcome to provide an odd number for voting and additional work share, and a 10th as reserve/backup in case of changes to CATS during the year.
- CATS developed the Sparks/Kitten roles in much greater detail this year, to allow a more formal onboarding process for someone who is new to volunteering with CATS or Apogaea. We also had our first Spark/Kitten this year who successfully managed the Art Fair and attended all meetings to learn more about CATS. There is no cap on the number of Sparks/Kittens that can volunteer. These Kitten positions are typically more task focused and mentored by a more experienced CAT. They also can join later in the year and closer to event, for those who wish to get involved but missed the July recruitment for Ignition positions. Sparks are encouraged to attend all monthly meetings, but are not required. They do not vote on the grants though they can share feedback. They will also choose a task-related role to work on throughout the year from available positions.

2018 Art Fair

There was no art fair in 2018. While 2017's art fair was a great success and well attended in partnering with the Fantastic Host's Rumpus in the Park event, this year the Pavillion space was unavailable due to repairs at the park. There appeared to be limited interest from this year's artists as well, so between the lack of designated kitten lead, the absence of the space we had wanted to use, and limited interest in artists to participate, we opted not to hold an art fair. It may be brought back in 2019 depending on interest by artists again.

2018 Art Tour

In 2018 CATS continued to host an art tour on site. It was very well attended, approximately 50-60 people participated in a hour-long tour, visiting and discussing more than a dozen of the granted art projects. This was the most successful art tour yet with highest attendance of any year. Both 2017 and 2016 had well attended tours as well. For comparison, the art tour in 2014 had fewer than 5 attendees. Starting from Center Camp has made it more accessible and well-attended. 4pm Friday start time has been convenient but also a little warm on some days - recommend that participants bring shade umbrellas in future perhaps. A number of the artists either came on the tour or were near their projects to give a first-hand description and inside info on their piece. CATS provided snacks and refreshments for the group, and support vehicle form DPW to carry the items. It was suggested that mutant vehicles or event infrastructure ATVs or Gators could provide transport for disabled participants to attend in future years though this was not officially announced for this year.

Funds Spent: \$165.09

2018 Transportation Assistance

This was not provided for 2018, but CATS has decided to add a new Transportation Funding round specifically for funding the transportation of art in 2019 to encourage artists from out of state to bring existing art pieces and also to separate transportation requests for funding from the general art rounds of funding.

2018 Other Expenses

Swag, Stickers, Signs and Gift

Grant Rounds

How is the grant budget determined?

The Art Grant Budget is set each year by the Apogaea Board of Directors. Historically, this has been an average of 32% of the previous year's gross ticket revenue. Why previous year's gross ticket revenue? Before there was an official budgeting process, the operational cash from the event came from the previous year's ticket sales. So, the grant budget was a reflection of the revenue available from the previous year.

This year's budget for granted art was planned to be reduced from prior year's history. Typically one third of the event revenue was returned to the art grant fund for the next year. In 2017 this level of funding caused undue budgetary crutches in other departments as the current land and size of the event has dictated additional costs for DPW and BAMF/safety. CATS was able to adjust the grant amounts in year to free up close to \$7000 of funding for these other departments to avoid a shortage. For 2018 the plan was to build this reduction in from the beginning to ensure all operational departments had their needs met as well. CATS requested 25% of the budget for art grants (\$49,000) and was approved for 21% (\$42,000). This



allowed other departments to meet their budgetary needs and going forward we expect the art grant budget to maintain a similar level of funding between 20-25% of the past year's revenue, unless there is significant changes to land, location or overhead that would dictate a change.

Even at this level of funding (21% or \$42,000), CATS did not award the full amount in grants and ended the year with a balance of \$11,700 in the art grant account. CATS received fewer applications and less requests for funding than many prior years. We believe this is due to two factors. One, the current land is further away from Denver than past event sites, which has reduced the overall population and attendance of the event and made logistics of transporting and setting up large art projects more difficult than in the past.

The second is that delays in receiving our budget did not allow us to open grant rounds until January and start funding artists until late February or early March. This allows about 3 months of build time for big money art projects, and CATS has received feedback from many of these larger installation artists that this is simply not long enough. We believe that promoting and opening the grant rounds earlier, and in turn funding artists 6+ months in advance will allow more of them to create large projects that need a significant amount of prep and planning. However the logistics of the board and entire event are such that the event budget is typically not able to be fully approved until December, so a creative solution is needed to solve this problem for the coming year.

To this end, CATS received approval to roll their budget overage of \$11,700 over into an earlier BIG Money round, and also receive preliminary funding of \$20,000 additional from the 2019 budget. This Big Money, Effigy and Temple round will open in September, immediately following Burning Man, rather than opening in January. Artists will have until November to apply and will receive notification and funds in December, giving them twice as long (over 6 months) to build their projects. CATS will then receive the remainder of their art grant budget for seed money grants, cash for gas, and operations along with all other departments at the standard timing in December or January.

How are grant rounds and amounts determined?

There are two competing ideas in the CATS, which gets considerable discussion each year. Each is valid, and has a valid argument, but are still at odds with each other:

1. We should fund a smaller number of larger art projects

Why? If we want serious, and ambitious art, then we need to be prepared to give out a small number of large grants to the most ambitious projects. You don't build massive projects taking months of work by large teams with sophisticated construction and interactions by handing out \$600 grants. "This isn't a craft fair, art is supposed to blow your mind, and sometimes that costs more."

2. We should fund a larger number of smaller art projects

Why? The art grant process exists partly as a way to support our community's "new" artists - people who have good projects in mind and just need a little funding to get rolling. Funding many small projects gives the most number of people that shot,

ultimately resulting in more art. "We aren't here to support only established artists with big plans, a complete support network, and lots of experience - we are here to encourage artistic expression among all participants, which means supporting more smaller projects."

Both of these arguments are valid.

In previous years, the three-round grant scheme was implemented with the intent of supporting both of these opposing goals. The Ludicrous and Big Money Rounds were fully intended support ambitious projects, and yes, that means fewer numbers of bigger pieces. The Seed Money round was intended to fall more in the direction of the second point - spreading funds around to support new artists who are just getting started with their public art, or who just have simpler projects in mind.



In 2016 only the Seed Round was completed due to extremely limited budget. With budget more "normal" for 2017, we evaluated the previous 3 round structure and found that there was a great deal of redundancy between the Ludicrous and the Big Money rounds. To streamline the grant process and make the application, promotion and scoring more time effective, we combined the Ludicrous and Big Money round into a single BIG MONEY round for large scale grants, as well as effigy and the temple applications. The SEED round continues as normal for smaller projects that need just a little support to become a reality.

This two-round scheme has worked well and will be continued, however we plan to add two additional "targeted" rounds that will run concurrently with the Big Money and Seed Round for 2019.

First, the Temple and Effigy Grant Round will run concurrently with the Big Money Round but as a seperate/distinct round of its own. The 2018 event year saw very few applicants for these two large and key pieces of community art. We believe by soliciting them in a separate round we will receive more attention for them and hopefully more applications. Both Temple and Effigy are considered large scale pieces so this grant round will be open at the same time as Big Money.

Secondly, a new grant round called Cash for Gas will run around the same time as Seed Money art grants. Cash for Gas will be targeted specifically at funding propane for fire artists and mileage/travel costs for all artists, but especially those coming from out of state to encourage cross-pollination between regionals. Funds in this new round will be largely targeted at existing projects that need gas to operate (propane) or gas to get there (mileage costs). This will allow the Seed Money round to focus more on the creation of new art projects and the Cash for Gas to focus on funding existing fire pieces and other existing piece's travel. We hope this will encourage more applications in both rounds since each is a little more specifically targeted to a certain funding goal.

All grant recipients receiving \$600.00 or more were required to submit a W-9.

Grant Guidelines

Things that ARE NOT funded by Apogaea grants:

- Apogaea tickets
- Alcohol
- Marijuana
- Anything illegal
- Payment for artist time or for performers to appear
- Projects with applications that are not complete and received by the deadline i.e. fully itemized budget, thoroughly
 thought out safety plans, detailed physical descriptions, etc.
- Art not being shown at Apogaea
- Bouncy Castles, Trampolines, Bungee Jumping, Rock Climbing Walls, Animals, Jumpy Pillows, and other types of entertainment, rodeo and carnival type devices and activities
- Explosives, fireworks, or pyrotechnic devices
- Sports/Leisure/Entertainment Activities and Devices
- Any temporary grandstand, tent, bleacher, stage and/or any other temporary structure
- Any type of aviation planes, helicopters, balloons, etc.
- All stunting activity (any feat or activity requiring special strength, skill, equipment, device or daring), or any practice,
 preparation of any such stunt
- Anything that, in the opinion of CATS or the Apogaea Board of Directors, presents a safety risk to participants
- Gifts or swag

Things that ARE funded by Apogaea grants

CATS tries to keep an open mind when considering what is eligible for grant funds. While basic needs/infrastructure like generators, domes, furniture, etc are currently eligible for grant funds, it is important to realize that a grant for a new camp generator, or to fix your camp's broken shower, might not be as appealing to the majority of CATS as a grant for something that is more in line with what we have funded in the past.

Except for the prohibited items, grant funds can be used for anything including, but not limited to the following types of items:


- Raw materials necessary to the construction or exhibition of the art including, but not limited to: wood, metal, fabric, glass, lighting, electronics, nails, screws, bolts, nuts, washers, adhesives, paint, wire, cable, tubing, stakes, decorative items. etc.
- Consumable items that are depleted during the construction or exhibition of the art including, but not limited to: sandpaper, saw blades, drill bits, glue, paint brushes, propane for fire art used at the event, fuel for generators used at the event
- Food and nonalcoholic beverages that have a strong artistic component. Any food grant is subject to the grantee complying with (and being able to demonstrate compliance with) all applicable state and local laws.
- Project expenses such as equipment rental and fuel used to bring your project to and from Apogaea

Grant Application Process

The Grant Robot

The Grant Robot is an Open Source project named <u>Weightlifter</u>. It is based on the <u>Laravel PHP framework</u>. The project is available in github, and anyone can use, improve, fork and customize the software. All commits and changes are tracked and users and developers can open bug against it. https://github.com/itsrachelfish/weightlifter

In 2018 we continued to optimize and make many improvements to the grant robot for a smoother application and scoring experience. We continue to make upgrades as issues arise. The main improvement in 2018 was the ability to track multiple grant rounds with different questions and criteria.



How are grants selected?

CATS Make Grant Recommendations

Scoring was handled online via the Grant Robot. CATS members score each application. After applications have been assigned a score, the ordered list is used at the in-person CATS meeting to drive the discussion and voting. Motions are made to individually fund projects with a specific amount of grant funds. Any application can be nominated for a grant at any time during the grant selection process, but CATS chose to review the grants in order of scoring this year. If the motion receives a majority vote, the application is added to the list of recommended grants. CATS members must be present at the meeting to vote.

Board Review

The list of recommended grants is sent to the designated board member for CATS to review with the CATS Board Liaison to make sure CATS isn't funding their vacations to a tropical island, that there aren't conflicts of interest, or any other concerns that need to be addressed before funding. In theory, after all of the reviewing, from the Grant Robot, the CATS, and members of the BOD, the approved grants should be viable and should be a responsible use of Apogaea's money.

Who applied for grants?

Anyone can apply for an Apogaea grant. Announcements were coordinated through Telemetry, the Apogaea, Inc. communications team which handles the website, the official and unofficial Apogaea Facebook pages, Yahoo mailing list, and other communication channels. The grant rounds were also were announced through Burning Man media outlets like Jack Rabbit Speaks and on other Burning Man Regionals' Facebook pages. All members of the CATS are encouraged to share information about the grants in their respective art communities. Applicants are allowed to re-submit their application in subsequent rounds if a grant was not awarded to the applicant in a given round.

Grant Statistics

In 2018, 49 applications were submitted by 43 artists for CATS to review; 24 were submitted in the Big Money Round and 25 were submitted in the Seed Money Round. 6 applicants submitted more than one application. **Of the 49 viable applications, 27 were approved and 22 were declined.** One application pulled themselves out of consideration and one project received funding outside of the granting process so that the event would have a Temple, which still resulted in 27 granted projects.

Who was awarded grants?

- A total of **49** applicants requested **\$82,509.36** in grant funds. An additional **\$1,200** was requested by the Effigy for the extra fire effects on burn night.
- One request came in after the grant rounds ended to fund a Temple, which received \$826 in grant money.
- A total of \$30,481.55 was granted to 27 projects (a contract with a specific grant amount was sent to the applicant)
- A total of \$28,948.55 was disbursed to 26 grant recipients.

Big Money Grants
Seed Round Grants

Projects that did not put reasonable effort into completing the project are tracked for posterity, and some may be subject to legal action, as determined by the Board of Directors. This did not apply to any grants in 2018, all artists completed their obligations and delivered projects in line with their contracts.

Tickets and Grants

There were 100 ticket codes allocated for CATS, 88 of which were used/sent to artists (78) and department volunteers (9). All 9 Ignition/Ground Control/Sparks tickets were redeemed and used. Of the 78 artist ticket codes issued only 56 were redeemed. The remaining unused 12 initial ticket codes and 22 unused artist codes were made available for purchase in the last public ticket sale.

All artist tickets are full price guaranteed ticket codes that allow artists a guaranteed ticket but no discount, except effigy and temple which receive a discounted (\$50 off) sparks level ticket. After discussion and reviewing feedback from several artists this year, CATS plans to make 2 discounted Sparks level tickets (\$50 discount) available to anyone receiving a 2019 Big Money Art Grant in recognition of these larger projects require more work and volunteer effort to complete.

All granted projects were offered and accepted 2 guaranteed ticket codes with the exception of Wyrm Food which requested only 1 ticket, Dragomi and Queen of the Night which requested and received 6 ticket codes, Big Puffy Yellow which requested and received 4 ticket codes, Big Charles (effigy) which requested and received 8 ticket codes in addition to the 2 discounted tickets, and Outside In which requested and received 12 ticket codes. Typically CATS considers and tries to accommodate any requests by artists for additional ticket codes they need within reason. This is a typical usage amount in line with past years where about 75% of tickets are used, especially since many of the smaller grants were awarded after the ticket sales.



Who showed up?

There were 27 art grants issues for 2018 and all artists created and displayed their project within the expectations of their grant and artist contract. CATS personally verified their installation and functionality at event during a walkthrough.

Applicant Feedback

A survey was sent to all **43 grant applicants**. With two weeks and two reminder emails, **18 (42%) artists completed the survey.** Google Forms was used for the Feedback questionnaire.



CATS Volunteer Time

We collected additional statistics on the grant review process this year, and after some quick calculations, we estimate that, including reviewing, questions, scoring, and in-person meetings, about 600 hours (meowers) were spent on the Seed Money Round applications between all CATS and over 1,000 hours on the Big Money Round applications. That is an average of over 3 hours per application. Every application is valuable to us, and all get careful consideration.

Why do we do it? Because we care about your art.

A sincere thanks to all those who have taken the time to imagine a project, sketch it, document it, model it, fill it into the application, and put yourself on the line - knowing full well that we are unable to fund everything and that you may hear unhappy news at the end. But please keep dreaming big dreams, and we'll keep running along after you, opening as many doors as we can.

If you want to get involved (and can budget around 50 hours of time between January and May), please consider joining the CATS next year! We start in September.

Good things that happened...And lessons learned!

While CATS did not receive enough applications to award the full art grant budget this event year, we have been able to work with the board to roll forward the overage as well as receive provisional partial funding early to start the grant process even earlier for 2019. The goal of this is to increase engagement with artists and make it easier for them to create large scale art with more lead time and time with funds in hand. This will solve an ongoing issue CATS has dealt with each year of not having their budget approved until several months after their timeline necessitates bu approving it partially to start the Big Money, Effigy and Temple rounds, and then completing budget funding for Seed and Operations at the normal budget times.



- CATS did not receive any viable applications for the Temple in the planned round or in a second call out for Temple applications. It was decided that there would not be a temple, however we then received a proposal from a new artist just a few weeks pre-event. The artist completed the normal grant application and responded to questions by the grant committee, however the standard scoring was not utilized to evaluate this application since it was not in a regular round. While the committee ultimately decided to fund the project just a couple weeks before event because it was a smaller than normal temple request at just \$826 and would fill what some may perceive as a void, the grant committee as a whole was in agreement that this is not a best practice and that any grant applications in the future should only be considered through the full process as normal, and not ad hoc, even for a key piece that was an identified need like Temple. The installation was completed as planned though the artist agreed that the short time frame was stressful. The written cloth panels from the event will be taken to the big burn on playa this year to be burned in the temple ceremony there too, which does hold significance for several community members. That said, CATS opinion is that it is best to adhere to our grant process and standards in the future even if it means omitting a piece like temple or effigy for a year. Funding on short time line at the last minute does not always lead to the highest quality or most desirable results and it is better to stick to the process, which is there for a reason.
- Despite being in a Stage 2 burn ban which did not even allow for smoking of cigarettes outside, We had an effigy burn with liquid fuels and several propane fire art pieces. Just a few days before the event we were informed that propane art pieces could only operate in one designated area which created some challenges for art pieces that had been placed elsewhere, however most artists displayed great resilience and a positive can-do attitude and successfully relocated or altered their art to meet to last minute changes in placement. Successful relations with the local fire marshals, involvement of new fire volunteer leadership (shout out to BAMF and Ken King for their awesome leadership and guidance!), and a good track record from 2016 and 2017 burns allowed us to bring lots of propane art to Apogaea this year. To avoid last minute changes in future we may encourage all fire art to be located in one area solely next year.
- Apogaea now owns a piece of propane art (Heart of Gold) that can be used at future events and other burn related

events throughout the year. Apogaea acquired this piece at the 2017 event and held a training session to educate several community members how to safely operate the piece this year in February. Additional modifications were made to the piece in February and in June to improve its safety and ease of setup including purchasing a chain hoist for lifting and mounting the heart in it's frame. This setup can now be accomplished with 3-4 people instead of 6-8 (though the more the merrier!). Art owned by the Apogaea org has had a downfall of often sitting unused in past years if it is not actively managed. We are pleased to say that this year the piece was active and used several times, an operating manual was built for it, and several improvements were made to it. We plan to continue operating it as a community piece at Apogaea and potentially at Decompression or other local burn events as well as an accessible piece of artwork that those interested in getting hands on with propane can gain supervised experience in setting up and operating propane art. The goal of this community piece is to maintain more fire art at local burn events and also allow opportunity for community members of any skill level to engage and learn about propane art.

- CATS worked with DPW and High Plains Propane to provide on site propane fills to all propane artists for the first time this year, giving them access to daily fills at a discounted rate which was both more convenient and a very welcome cost savings for these artists. This goes hand in hand with CATS goal of supporting and bringing as much fire art as possible to the event, and needing to focus this on being non-ember producing fire art due to ongoing burn bans. We plan to continue this relationship and offer next year and will be opening a specific "propane" (Cash for Gas) round to allow artists to apply to have Apogaea cover these costs of on site propane fills as well.
- CATS took steps to simplify and improve the grant process, making it less time consuming and more streamlined for scoring, voting and for applicants
- CATS will be creating a new grant round to support propane costs and transportation costs specifically in the coming
 year, in an effort to encourage more out of state artists and fire artists to participate in addition to new artists and
 established artists creating new art.
- The Art Tour continues to be well attended and received additional vehicle support from DPW to assist with bringing drinks and snacks en route to keep all attendees hydrated, happy, and engaged with the tour.
- The new process for distributing granted art signs was smoother and easier than any year past and will be repeated going forward.
- There was no attrition in volunteers this year, CATS play nice and work well as a team and generally had lots of fun and catnip this year. Meow!
- No one was hurt during the production of this report (at least physically).
